7 **Rohingya Muslims** A question was asked by Lord Alton of Liverpool and answered by Lord Ahmad of Wimbledon.

8 **Fisheries Bill [HL]** Lord Gardiner of Kimble presented a bill to make provision in relation to fisheries, fishing, aquaculture and marine conservation; to make provision about the functions of the Marine Management Organisation; and for connected purposes. It was read a first time and ordered to be printed. (HL Bill 71)

9 **Fisheries Bill [HL]** The Explanatory Notes on the bill were ordered to be printed. (HL Bill 71–EN)

10 **Buses (Zero Emissions) Bill [HL]** Lord Paddick, on behalf of Baroness Randerson, presented a bill to prohibit the registration of public service vehicles manufactured after 2025 which emit carbon; and to prohibit the registration of other public service vehicles which emit carbon after 2035. It was read a first time and ordered to be printed. (HL Bill 72)

11 **Local Authorities (Transport Powers) Bill [HL]** Lord Shipley presented a bill to empower local authorities to introduce Workplace Parking Levies with immediate effect and to impose penalty charges for moving traffic contraventions. It was read a first time and ordered to be printed. (HL Bill 73)

12 **Police Conduct (Operation Conifer) Inquiry Bill [HL]** Lord Black of Brentwood presented a bill to make provision for an inquiry into police conduct of Operation Conifer to be established. It was read a first time and ordered to be printed. (HL Bill 74)

13 **Hereditary Peerages and Baronetcies (Equality of Inheritance) Bill [HL]** Lord Lucas presented a bill to amend the law regarding succession to peerages and baronetcies and eligibility to stand for election as a hereditary member of the House of Lords; and for connected purposes. It was read a first time and ordered to be printed. (HL Bill 75)

14 **Data Protection (Independent Complaint) Bill [HL]** Baroness Kidron presented a bill to amend the Data Protection Act 2018 to grant representative bodies and organisations power to exercise independent complaint and remedy rights on behalf of data subjects. It was read a first time and ordered to be printed. (HL Bill 76)

15 **Direct Payments to Farmers (Legislative Continuity) Bill** Lord Gardiner of Kimble moved that the bill be now read a second time. After debate, the motion was agreed to and the Committee was negatived. Then, Standing Order 46 having been dispensed with, the bill was read a third time and passed.

16 **Statutory Instruments** A message was brought from the Commons that they have appointed a Select Committee of seven Members to join with a Committee appointed by the Lords as the Joint Committee on Statutory Instruments.

17 **Social mobility** A question was asked by Baroness Tyler of Enfield and, after debate, answered by Baroness Berridge.
