Prayers were read by the Lord Bishop of Chichester.

1 **Queen's Speech** The Lord Chamberlain, Lord Parker of Minsmere, delivered Her Majesty's reply to the Address of 18 May, as follows:

"I have received with great satisfaction the dutiful and loyal expression of your thanks for the speech which His Royal Highness The Prince of Wales opened the present session of Parliament on my behalf."

3 **Probation and Court Services: workload** A question was asked by Baroness Blower and answered by Lord Stewart of Dirleton.

4 **Male victims of crime: support** A question was asked by Lord Ponsonby of Shulbrede and answered by Baroness Williams of Trafford.

5 **Retrofitting buildings: national strategy** A question was asked by Baroness Blackstone and answered by Baroness Bloomfield of Hinton Waldrist.

6 **Ryanair: Afrikaans language test** A question was asked by Baroness Chakrabarti and answered by Baroness Vere of Norbiton.

7 **Health Promotion Bill [HL]** Lord Addington presented a bill to re-establish the Office for Health Improvement and Disparities as the Office of Health Promotion; to establish a National Plan for Sport to coordinate, support and maintain access to sporting and recreational facilities essential to public health; and for connected purposes. It was read a first time and ordered to be printed. (HL Bill 24) [I]

8 **Public Advocate Bill [HL]** Lord Wood of Anfield, on behalf of Lord Wills, presented a bill to establish a public Advocate to provide advice to, and act as data controller for, representatives of the deceased after major incidents. It was read a first time and ordered to be printed. (HL Bill 25)

9 **Ukraine: defence relationships** (3-hour debate) Lord Liddle moved that this House takes note of (1) the impact of the conflict in Ukraine, (2) the implications for the Integrated Defence Review, and (3) the case for the United Kingdom strengthening (a) its relationships with the European Union and other European allies, and (b) its commitment to NATO. After debate, the motion was agreed to.

10 **Northern Ireland Protocol: First Treasury Counsel** Lord Stewart of Dirleton repeated as a statement the answer given to an Urgent Question asked in the House of Commons.

11 **Travel disruption at UK airports and ferry ports** A question was asked by Lord Davies of Brixton and, after debate, answered by Baroness Vere of Norbiton.

12 **Cost of living** (2-hour debate) Lord Eatwell moved that this House takes note of (1) the increasing cost of living, (2) the level of economic resilience in the social capital of the United Kingdom, and (3) the case for Her Majesty's Government to take further steps to address these issues. After debate, the motion was agreed to.

13 Health and Social Care leadership review Lord Kamall answered questions on a statement made in the House of Commons on Wednesday 8 June.
